BISD is the largest poverty district in Texas serving 43,000 students at 95.8% economically disadvantaged. BISD has the HIGHEST poverty rate in Texas (<46,000 pops.) and 5th highest in the nation. All BISD students qualify for FREE and REDUCED Lunch rates (FRLR).	BISD created the LISTO (Literacy Innovations for Successful Teaching Opportunities) Conferences to address the 6th-12th grade challenges associated with working with a large Hispanic economically disadvantaged geographical area. BISD will address that the content of literacy conferences will focus on knowledge-building curriculum, and that BISD has successful experience and expertise in implementation of a knowledge-building program (Appendix). The PD Dept had 2,455 total workshops with 165,487 participants for 2020-21 and ISET Conference.

At the end of every grant year, BISD will host a full day Conference for 400 teachers from grades 6th-12th grade teaching at 20 High Needs secondary schools in Year 1. The conference titled, 'Post-Pandemic Literacy: Teaching Students with Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and Learning Loss' will positively impact 90% of the participants using a survey and evaluation scale. Teachers will experience new strategies to help the Covid Learning Slide and foster healthy ways to implement remote learning strategies for the home and school environment. A futuristic Literacy World will allow teachers face to face presentations, global remote learning experiences, hands on workshops with modern technology for literacy improvements that focus on knowledge-building curriculum aligned to state standards.

BISD Grants department utilizing Edwin Barrera, BISD Grant Specialist, with 30 years of grant experience evaluating and implementing both federal and state grants, will ensure that evaluation data will be used to determine when to modify the project plan, including, if quarterly progress or summative SMART goals do not show progress. The proposal also includes but is not limited to consistent, collection of data that measures progress to stated benchmark goals and process of data analysis and related programmatic adjustments. 2021-2022 Texas Reading Initiative - Literacy Coaching and Professional Development Grades K-5 data will be aligned to benchmarks and metrics in prior section. In order to ensure project's success, careful monitoring will be in place to evaluate and ensure participants are meeting benchmark goals. The goal of BISD is to improve long term literacy. The current percent of AA degrees of HS BISD graduates is 0% compared to the Region at 5% and to the state standard of 2% for all of the seven BISD High Schools (2019-20 TAPR).

**PROGRAM MODIFICATION-** The grant will meet with stakeholders to discuss existing barriers and meet with teachers, as needed, and/or district administrator to discuss barriers a student is experiencing and develop an action plan. Participants not meeting the intervention standards will receive additional support and development opportunities in the areas of need, informal or format intervention plan, and/or additional opportunities for continued professional development.

**PROGRAM FEEDBACK-**A survey will be administered to students, teachers, literacy coaches, and district contacts every 6 months. All stakeholders will provide feedback regarding the experience with the program, provide information regarding additional assistance/support needed in order for the students to succeed and have the opportunity to provide feedback on how to improve the services. Careful analysis of data provided through these surveys will be conducted. Additional support and training will be provided through round-table meetings and/or professional development. The BISD Leadership Design Team (LDT) will meet monthly to ensure the Reading Conference Framework is being developed on schedule.

BISD provides high-quality professional development yearly for ongoing high-quality professional development to all teachers, principals, other school leaders and specialized instructional support personnel. The Professional Development had 2,455 total workshops with 165,487 participants for 2020-21. Approximately 97,309 participated in an all day session (8:00 am-5:00 pm) such as a conference timeline indicating that BISD will have a tremendous turnout at these conferences with 397 workshops occurring in June and 298 in August. The top 12 Professional Development workshops includes: CURRICULUM DEPARTMENT (842 Workshops), PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT (603), BILINGUAL DEPARTMENT (258), SPECIAL SERVICES (154), COLLEGE & CAREER READINESS (83), DYSLEXIA PROGRAM (70), RESEARCH/EVALUATION (55), CAREER & TECHNOLOGY (52), AREA ADMINISTRATOR (51), GUIDANCE & COUNSELING (40), COMPUTER SERVICES (37), HEALTH SERVICES (32), SPECIAL PROGRAMS (30). BISD also offers Online, face to face and after school sessions. The Annual Innovation Strategy and Educational Technology (ISET) Bash draws in 300 conference attenders every year with 30 different workshops (See Appendix A-ISET Conference Program Booklet and Evaluation). BISD will partner with Texas Southmost College and utilize their ITEC Mall Facility to maximize the higher education partnership for a higher quality conference.

LITERACY STRATEGIES- BISD will develop NEW strategies and literacy services to better integrate comprehensive literacy instruction into a well-rounded education. This includes involving multiple stakeholders (parents, teachers, counselors, community members, colleges, etc.) to strengthen both the academic and social/emotional skills and support necessary for literacy and college readiness. BISD will provide both academic and social/emotional support for students to be successful in rigorous academic and literacy experiences. BISD provides wrap-around strategies and services as well as the additional literacy strategies and services that are planned in the Literacy Conference. The Conference will focus on the literacy needs but also on college success as BISD is lagging behind the region on AA attainment. BISD has 0% of the students earning a AA along with a HS diploma as compared to the region percentage of 5% and the state of 2%. BISD students also matriculate primarily to the closest community college which has a low retention rate of 65% from freshmen to sophomore year. LISTOS, Spanish for ready, will address not just K-12 challenges but the challenges of having these students complete a postsecondary education.

BISD will coordinate comprehensive literacy instruction with early childhood education programs such as Head Start, Reach Out and Read Programs, after-school programs such as 21st CCLC Grants or ACE (Afterschool Centers on Education) and Extended Learning to include ADSY (Additional Days School Year) activities in the area served by BISD. Reach Out and Read is a partner with the Innovation Approaches to Literacy (IAL) grant that BISD has been awarded by ED. They will also host a workshop for promoting Early Literacy through working with doctor and clinics for family literacy even before children show up to school. In addition, Community in Schools will host a workshop on how to help poor families with holistic services to include drop out prevention strategies, signs of mental health issues and home literacy. The Parent Department will also host a Table for addressing the needs of illiterate parents and the adult continuing education programs available in our service areas. Foremost, BISD is in partnership with the City of Brownsville (COB) aligning the library services to meet the demands of the 21st century. Each library has been remodeled with maker-spaces, cafes, kivas and modern furniture for all 53 schools. BISD is also working the Ministerial and Business Alliance (MBA) to promote partnerships for adopting schools from organizations near or in relationship with the schools. The MBA will help meet the needs of literacy, college readiness and poverty needs with resources and services not easily available to schools at no cost to the district.

HQ INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS- BISS LISTO Plan will provide a high quality literacy conference including incorporating the use of high quality instructional materials currently recommended by the state of Texas to support a knowledge building approach to learning. These HQ materials includes; Blended Learning Literacy Basics: Engage and support ALL learners!, Engaging English-Language learners with iPad, Augmented and virtual reality Literacy tools for education, MS Teams integration, Differentiating Instruction/Assessment using google forms. REGIONAL LEAD-The rationale as to why BISS is best suited to lead regional conferences is the size and distance from ESC 1. The total amount of schools and students in Cameron County is significant on its own. Education Service Center One in Hidalgo County is about a 3 hour round trip (130 total miles) from Brownsville ISD. BISS is the furthest ISD from ESC 1 adding to time and money loss due to distance. Many teachers believe that taking nearly a 1/2 day for just travel is too much of a loss of day for only 1/2 day of training and rather not pursue HQ ESC 1 trainings in Edinburg. BISS is also the largest ISD in South Texas with approximately 43,000 students and a staff of 6,487. BISS has 33% of teachers (939) that have less than 10 years of experience.

The proposed conference participation goals and outcomes-focused success metrics for each conference includes; Year 1: Conference Post-Pandemic Literacy: Teaching Students with Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and Learning Loss; Year 2: Comprehensive Family Literacy and Reading Through Super Libraries; Year 3: Hispanic Literacy Conference: Spark Curiosity, Ignite Potential. Program Goals and Objectives includes:

- Reach 100% of the targeted high needs Elementary schools with 400 teachers participating as trainers of trainers.
- Recruit the Best Regional, State and National Speakers for the Conference that bring the most relevant and timely training for the teachers based on the yearly conference topic.
- A Resource Bag for each participant with high quality teacher materials and literacy resources
- Establish yearly partners and sponsors for the conference
- Recruit Vendors and organizations for exhibits and door prizes
- Provide high quality meals to include continental breakfast, lunch and snacks
- Create a safe environment for all participants
- Establish Swag rooms for refreshing and networking opportunities

BISD plans to recruit schools and districts to attend the LIT conferences in Qualified Opportunity Zones (QOZs) as 4 QOZs are located in Brownsville alone with an additional emphasis on serving a high Hispanic (98.3%) student pop, At risk of educational failure (68%), students living in poverty (95.8%), English Learners (36.1%), students with disabilities (14.1%-5,734), not completing a college degree (96%). BISD has established relational grants and shared services with Point Isabel ISD, Los Fresnos ISD and San Benito CISD. BISD has 12 (23%) of the 53 schools in targeted support by TEA and 15 (28%) schools with a D-F Rating in one of the 2019 TEA School Progress Indicators (TxSchools.gov). BISD must also offer a conference with bilingual emphasis as many of the teachers are designated Bilingual/ESL ED (36%) compared to TX at 20%. A few samples of session titles that will help recruit teachers includes; Blended Learning Literacy Basics: Engage and support ALL learners!, Engaging English-Language learners with iPad, Playgrounds-Augmented and virtual reality tools for Literacy education, and EL Teams integration, Differentiating Instruction/Assessment using google forms as well as support for the latest Literacy apps in the market.
